does not offer an elementary summer program; information about Waverly's summer classes for middle and high school students will be shared in the next few weeks.

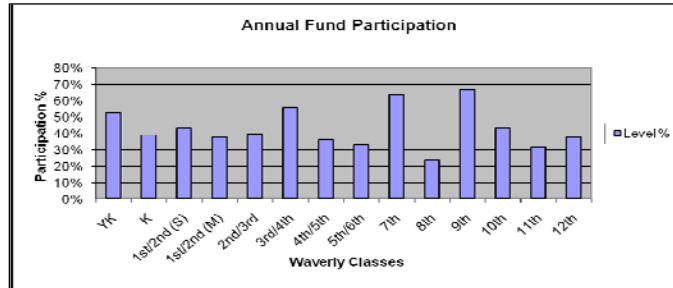
FREE CHILDCARE
